1. Purpose. As mandated in reference (a), the Department of the Navy has been directed to use the new DD Form 2807-1, Report of Medical History, DD Form 2807-2, Medical Prescreen of Medical History Report, and DD Form 2808, Report of Medical Examination, instead of the SF 88, Report of Medical Examination and SF 93, Report of Medical History.

2. Background

a. The Department of Defense (DOD) created new physical examination forms because of changes in medical terminology and to use technology for documenting and tracking medical history throughout the military life cycle.

b. The SF 88 and SF 93 were two key documents for all physical examinations throughout the DOD medical system, in most instances they have been replaced with subject forms. As the Navy moves toward a paperless, electronic document system the DD 2807-1, DD 2807-2, and the DD 2808 have been designed with future automation in mind and to improve information collected during the medical examination. The forms shall be used for initial accession, periodic physical examinations and for special examinations, for example, in aviation and undersea medicine. The information will lead to better management of the health status of military members.

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c. Besides physical examinations, the new forms impact a wide range of responsibility such as medical examinations for ionizing radiation, radiation health, aviation and undersea medicine, the medical record, and the Disability Evaluation System.

3. DD 2807-1, Report of Medical History, shall be used in lieu of the SF 93 in references (b) through (i) except for those instances waived in paragraph 4. DD 2808, Report of Medical Examination, shall be used in lieu of the SF 88. DD Form 2807-2, Medical Prescreen of Medical History Report, shall be used for applicants processing through the Military Entrance Processing Stations only. Exams previously recorded on the SF 88 and SF 93, accomplished under the old guidelines, will be considered valid and need not be repeated.

4. Exception. Medical examinations for ionizing radiation, radiation health, aviation medicine, and undersea medicine may continue to be documented on the Report of Medical Examination (SF 88) and Report of Medical History (SF 93) until replaced with analogous forms. Only these specific exceptions may continue to use the SF 88 and SF 93 to document medical examinations.
