



Captain Rosemary C. Malone
Commanding Officer

A native of Forest View, Illinois, Captain Malone graduated from Saint Mary's College (now University), Winona, Minnesota, in 1982 with a Bachelor of Arts degree. She received a Commission in the United States Navy and taught Chemistry, Radiological Fundamentals, and Materials at Naval Nuclear Power School in Orlando, Florida, between 1982 and 1984. She then drilled as a line officer with the Navy Reserve.

Captain Malone was commissioned as a Lieutenant in the Medical Corps after graduating from the Medical University of South Carolina in 1997 and receiving her Doctor of Medicine degree. She next completed a psychiatry internship and residency in 2001 with the National Capital Consortium's Program at the National Naval Medical

Center (NNMC), Walter Reed Army Medical Center (WRAMC), and Malcolm Grow Medical Center. She was selected NNMC's Intern of the Year in 1998.

Upon completion of her residency, Captain Malone served as the Psychiatrist at the Naval Hospital, Sigonella, Sicily, from 2001 to 2003. She then completed forensic psychiatry fellowship training in 2003 at WRAMC. Malone was next assigned to NNMC, Bethesda, Maryland, as the Forensic Psychiatrist from September 2004 to March 2009. While there, she began as a department head and culminated her tour as the Director of Mental Health. Malone deployed in April 2006 as the Department Head of the Behavioral Health Services, Detention Hospital, Joint Medical Group, Joint Task Force (JTF), Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. She then served as Psychiatrist and Medical Officer for a special JTF task force from October 2006 to March 2007. Malone also served as the Acting Officer in Charge of the Detention Hospital during a unique evolution of the highest national visibility involving high-value suspected terrorists.

Following her tour at NNMC, Captain Malone was assigned as the Forensic Psychiatrist and Chief Deputy Medical Examiner, Psychological Investigations Division, Armed Forces Medical Examiner System, Rockville, Maryland, from April 2009 to November 2010. While there, she was selected to serve on the Secretary of Defense's panel reviewing the Fort Hood shootings. Malone was next assigned to the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery from November 2010 to November 2012. Her positions included Director of Deployment Health and the Navy Director of Psychological Health.

In November 2012, Captain Malone was selected to serve as the Commander's Executive Assistant at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center. In June 2014, she graduated from the National War College, National Defense University, Fort Lesley J. McNair, District of Columbia, with a Master of Science degree in National Security Strategy. From September 2014 to May 2016, Malone was the Executive Officer of the Naval Health Clinic Charleston, South Carolina.

Captain Malone is an Assistant Professor of Psychiatry at the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences. She is a diplomate of the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology in Psychiatry and Forensic Psychiatry. She has participated in over 30 courts-martial, including trials for the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, and Coast Guard. Malone has also served as a consultant to the Office of Military Commissions, the Department of Justice's Civil Rights Division, and the Department of Defense's Office of General Counsel. Malone's awards include the Defense Meritorious Service Medal (two awards), the Meritorious Service Medal (four awards), the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal (two awards), the Army Commendation Medal, and the Navy Achievement Medal (two awards).

Captain Malone is married to Col. Rick D. Malone, Medical Corps, U.S. Army, who is the Forensic Psychiatrist at U.S. Army Criminal Investigation Command, Quantico, Virginia. They have five adult children, Ms. Lauren Carr, Mr. Michael Carr, Dr. Bethany Malone, Mr. Richard Malone, and Ms. Isis Malone.
