## PLATFORM IN FOCUS: EXPEDITIONARY RESUSCITATIVE SURGICAL SYSTEM (ERSS)

Founded in 2009, ERSS are multicomponent (trauma and surgery) mobile teams designed to provide close to the point-of-injury support, afloat, undersea or ashore during combat or contingency operations with minimal personnel and portable equipment. This capability significantly enhances medical flexibility and mobility for expeditionary or distributed maritime operations.




ERSS TEAM COMPOSITION OVERVIEW

#### Capabilities:

- 7-Person Teams Role 2 Basic Capability
- Damage control surgery module
- Damage control resuscitation module
- Man portable gear sets
- Function undersea, afloat, or ashore
- Capacity: 3 critical / 5 non-critical patients

To support enduring readiness of the Navy's "fight tonight" medical assets, ERSS teams will be assigned to military-civilian partnerships and operate on a tiered readiness model, along with a full-time embedded support cadre at each partnership site.



# NAVY MEDICINE *FAST FACTS*



On 21 September 1972, President Nixon signed the Uniformed Services Health Professionals Revitalization Act of 1971. The legislation directed the Defense Secretary to establish a Department of Defense medical school and a Health Professions Scholarship Program (HPSP) for prospective physicians, dentists, nurse practitioners, physician assistants, optometrists, psychologists, and pharmacists.

#### UNIFORMED SERVICES UNIVERSITY OF THE HEALTH SCIENCES (USUHS)

Since 1976, when the inaugural class matriculated, more than 5,000 physicians have graduated from USUHS.

- Alumni include two Surgeons General (Vice Adm. C. Forrest Faison III, and Rear Adm. Bruce Gillingham) and Deputy Surgeon General (Rear Admiral Darin Via).
- Students attending USU can focus on their education without the worry of incurring debt. Medical students enter the University as commissioned officers in one of the four uniformed services: Army, Navy, Air Force or Public Health Service. No prior service is required for admission to USU.
- The Inaugural Class graduated in 1980. It was comprised of 29 students including six Navy physicians:

- The F. Edward Hébert School of Medicine matriculated its forty-fourth class with 3,096 applicants having competed for 171 positions. The incoming class is comprised of 85 women and 86 men. Forty-two percent of the applicant pool was female.
- The average age of the entrants at the time of application was 24.6 years.
- Geographically, the student representation is as follows: the Northeast is the legal residence of 24 percent; 36 percent are from the South; 14 percent are from Central; and 26 percent are from the West.

#### HEALTH PROFESSIONS SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM (HPSP)

- In 2022, the Navy awarded 329 HPSP scholarships (MC: 239, DC: 75, MSC: 15).
- Benefits Include: 100% of the cost of medical school, dental school or qualifying postgraduate school.
  - A monthly stipend of \$2,200+ to cover living expenses for up to four years.
  - A sign-on bonus of up to \$10,000 for medical school and dental school candidates.
