

There are two options for reporting **Intimate Partner Violence (IPV)**, often referred to as **domestic violence**, through the Family Advocacy Program (FAP). **Restricted reporting** is **NOT AN OPTION if** someone is in **imminent danger** or if a child is being abused. In cases of **child abuse**, law enforcement and child protective services **MUST** be notified.

## UNRESTRICTED REPORT

Disclose the IPV incident to trigger an official investigation and Command notification

Report the IPV incident to **Chain of Command**, **FAP victim advocate or clinician, healthcare provider**, or **military law enforcement.** A chaplain can make the report to your Chain of Command on your behalf if you prefer.

**Command is notified**. If the alleged offender is active duty, Command may take **administrative action** against them. Law enforcement will **conduct an investigation**, including contacting the alleged offender.

You will have access to **support and protection from Command**, such as a No Contact Order, Military Protective Order, and/or Expedited Transfer, and access to a **FAP victim advocate** who will work with you to develop a **safety plan** and identify **next steps.** 

The following **optional support services** are available through FAP: medical care, counseling, medical/sexual assault forensic exam, and victims legal counsel.

## **RESTRICTED REPORT**

Confidentially disclose the IPV incident to specified individuals **WITHOUT triggering an investigation** 

Report the IPV incident to **FAP victim advocate, FAP clinician, or healthcare provider** ONLY. Victims are entitled to the protections of privileged communication with a chaplain, but this is not considered a report and will not connect you to FAP services.

Law enforcement is **NOT notified\***, and Command is **NOT notified or involved**. \*In some locations, healthcare providers are mandatory reporters and therefore required to call the police if a patient discloses IPV. In the US, healthcare providers are mandatory reporters in CA, CO, KY, NH, and RI.

You will have access to a **FAP victim advocate** who will work with you to develop a **safety plan** and identify **next steps**.

The following **optional support services** are available through FAP: medical care, counseling, medical/sexual assault forensic exam, and victims legal counsel.
